School & Community

Franklin Academy is a public comprehensive secondary school with approximately ninety faculty members serving 750 students, grades 9-12. The school district encompasses approximately 366 square miles, with the school located in the rural village of Malone, New York. Malone is located near a variety of social and recreational activities. The Lake Placid region is just over 50 miles south and Montreal is just over an hour's drive to the northeast. Malone has a 36 hole golf course and a medium sized ski resort.

Curriculum

Students are encouraged to select rigorous courses that will provide an intellectual challenge and will better prepare them for future educational and career pursuits beyond high school.

✦ All students are required to take a core program consisting of English and Social Studies for 4 years, and a minimum of 3 years of Math and Science.

✦ Students are given the opportunity to attend a Career and Technical Education program during their junior and senior years in one of the following areas: Auto Technology, Building Trades, Child Development, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts, Early Childhood Education, Electrical Trades, Health Occupations, Heavy Equipment, HVAC, or Metalworking/Welding.

Advanced Placement Program

The Advanced Placement (AP) Program provides students with the opportunity to pursue college-level studies while still in high school. Upon completion of the courses, students may receive AP credit when entering college. Academically oriented students are strongly encouraged to participate in the AP Program at Franklin Academy. We offer the following course for AP credit:

Accelerated/Honors Courses

If a middle school student successfully completes a high school credit course, the credit earned is used to satisfy graduation requirements. The grades earned are included when calculating the student's grade point average. Most students complete 1 unit of study in Spanish or French. Approximately 10% of students are recommended for accelerated classes in math and science based on grades, teacher input, and state assessments. Students may also be recommended to take honors classes in English and Social Studies.

Dual Enrollment Courses

FA students are offered the opportunity to earn college credit through articulation agreements with North Country Community College, Paul Smith's College, St. Lawrence University, and SUNY Plattsburgh. The dual enrollment courses (listed below) meet both high school and college course requirements. Students take these courses at the high school campus with high school faculty.

New Vision Health Careers Exploration Program

This is a competitive, half day career exploration program affiliated with University of Vermont Health Network at Alice Hyde Medical Center offered to 12th graders who have completed 3 credits in advanced math and science. Participants take English 12, Economics, Government, Psychology of Human Relations, and Personal and Family Health, and do clinical rotations in all hospital departments. Students have the option of completing college credits in English Composition, Psychology of Human Relations, American Government and Politics, and Personal and Family Health. In the afternoon, students return to Franklin Academy to complete their remaining course work.

New Vision Law and Government Program

This is a competitive, half day career exploration program in the field of law and government offered to 12th graders. In this program, students will gain experience with the judiciary, legislature, and private practices. Participants take English 12, Economics, Government and Political Science combined with practicum experience through legal rotations. Students have the option of completing college credits in English Composition and American Government & Politics. In the afternoon students return to Franklin Academy to complete their remaining course work.

New Vision Programming/Game Design/Coding

This is a competitive, half day career exploration program in the field of computer science offered to 12th graders who have completed a minimum of three credits each in advanced math and science. Participants take English 12, Economics, Government, and Introduction to Java/C++/PHP/Python. Students have the option of completing college credits in English Composition and American Government and Politics. In the afternoon students return to Franklin Academy to complete their remaining course work.

Class Rank/GPA

A *weighted* class rank and grade point average is calculated based on a 4.0 scale. The following courses as weighted as follows:

Honors - 5.0 scale College Dual Enrollment Courses - 5.0 scale
All Others - 4.0 scale Advanced Placement (AP) courses - 6.0 scale

Grades for all classes taken, with the exception of physical education, Swinging Sounds, and Jazz Band, are computed for a rank and GPA. Courses carrying more than one credit are calculated based on a factor equivalent to the number of credits for the course. (e.g. Career Technical Education Courses carry 4 credits, therefore the grade is counted 4 times). If a course is retaken the higher grade of the two is used for the purposes of rank and average. At the end of the first semester of the senior year final class rank and average will be computed.
